This principle was fully set forth by certain recent proceedings in Wisconsin. Some women, it will be remembered, incensed at who would sell to their husbands and relatives, contrary to their express wishes and a open violation of the law on the subject, took the matter into their own hands, and applied the only remaining remedy. A number of them went in a body to these several establishments, broke up the bar furniture, bottles &c., and destroyed all the liquor on the premises they could lay their hands on. They were subsequently prosecuted by the keepers, tried and acquitted! on the ground that no legal offence had been committed against these persons. This is a view of the case worth the special consideration of

those engaged in the traffic. Again, throughout Ohio, the Courts and Magistrates are fining and imprisoning Liquor sellers for violating the law recently enacted in that state to that effect.
