WAR NEWS. By Pacific-Liverpool dates to 12th. The news from the seat of war shows no portant or decisive action among the belligerents, but as though all the parties concerned, the English and French affice in particular, would gladly take advantage of the first plausible excuse to return and settle down quietly at their homes.

The Continental letters express doubt of

the intention of Austria; and at Berlin there.

was a feeling of depression owing to the belief that the Cabinet was assisting Russia by a pressure upon the Austrian government.— The Emperor of Austria has countermanded the advance of her army into Wallachin.—
It is stated that the military torce in the Baltic will be increased to 23,000 or 25,000 men.—A battle had taken place in Asia be-tween the Russians and a lorce of Turkish Bashi-Bazouks, in which the latter lost 3000 men. The cholera is raging at St. Petersburg. Four hundred cases, are said to have occurred there in one day.

The Turks have crossed the Danube in considerable force, and an action occurred on the 5th at Giurgevo, in which one hundred and sixty Russians were killed and three-hundred wounded.—The accounts relative to the evacuation of the Principalities by Russia, are very contradictory.—It is reported Russia is concentrating a force of 300,000 men to resist the Austrians .- Thirty thousand Russians have advanced from Odessa towards the Pruth. -The Turks, on the 8th. after a long struggle, got possession of the Islands of Mokan and Oineika and subse-

quently of Guisgevo.—The Russians have been totally defeated in the Wallachian Teritory .- Prince Gortshakoff was forming a camp of 30,000 men between Buchavest and the Danube. The Emperor of Russia admits his readiiess to agree to terms which will give him a joint I rotectorate, with the other four powers, over the Greek christians in Turkey, provided that France and England withdraw their troops from the Principalities, which he will also leave, and that Austria give up he prosecution of concessions she obtained it er treaty with Turkey.
