ENORMOUS LEAK! \$17,200 required for the Poor House in 1855!

Our readers will no doubt, be surprised to learn that the above sum is estimated by the Directors of the Poor for the year 1855, in addition to the produce of a farm of 200 acres, to support the Poor of the County .-To give our readers some idea of the amount, we will state that the whole proceeds of the taxes of the County for all county purposes, last year and this, will only amount to about \$37,000 per annum, and \$17,200 of this sums is required for the support of the Poor House. One of three things is certain,-the number of paupers must be increasing in a threefoid ratio-there is shameful mismanagement -or, a regular system of cribbing practised. The following sums have been drawn from the County Treasury for the last few years: S5,500 | 1850.
