Hill and Zeigenfuss say from seventy-five to one hundred lbs. The former may speak of the first and the latter of the second quality.— Murray says he tried and found two hundred and seventeen lbs; in one ton. Williams confirms it, at least he says a wheelbarrow of slate could be picked from one ton.
