The Lehigh rates are about 30 cents a ton higher and the transportation and tolls on the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad are 30 cents a ton higher, and the Canal 20 cents a ton higher than last year's rates the Schuylkill Coal Operators are the only producers in the trade that have not advanced the price of Coal; but, on the contrary, many kinds are absolutely selling at less than the opening rates of last year. Now is It not a burning shame for the press in our cities, and particularly New York, under such circumstances, to be blazing forth the large receipts of these Companies, with a view to run up their stock-finding no fault with their advance in rates, which enhances the price of Coal from 20 to 45 cents a ton-and in the same papers charge the Individual Coal Operaters of the Schuylkill region with being extortionists, &c.; while they are selling their Coal at less now than the low opening rates of last year. If the tundies of these Companies don't soon cease this kind of warfare on the Coal Operators of this County, we will expose the whole game of these writers, and throw a bombshell into their camp which will scatter all their fanciod stock operations to the four winds of Heaven.

VIENNA CONFERENCE ENDED. The Demands of the Allies Rejected by Russia. BOMBARDMENT OF SEBASTOPOL.

New Loan of Sixteen Millions Sterling taken by the Rothschilds.

ENGLAND ASSENTS TO NAPOLEON TAKING COMMAND OF THE ALLIED ARMY. Increase of Taxes-New Stamp Duty. COMMERCIAL. SANDY HOOK, May 4-The Steamship At-

way to the city, where she will arrive about 1 o'clock. She brings Liverpool dates to the 23d ult. Only twelve sessions of the Conference were held. There are strong indications that Aus-

tria will refuse to act against Russia. Lord John Russell and M. Drouin de l'Hays, have eft Vienna. The news is highly important. The Vienna Conference has been broken up, Russia having rejected the demands of the Allies.

The bombardment of Sebastopol by the Allies with 500 guns, commenced on the 9th. and continued incessantly up to the 15th.-The assault is deemed to be not practicable, but the intention is to storm it if possible. The Emperor and Empress of France have been in England for a week. The new British loan of sixteen millions

sterling has been taken by the Rothschilds. It is to terminate at the end of thirty years. The taxes on incomes are to be increased, and also upon spirits, tea, coffee and sugar. A stamp duty is also proposed. England assents to Louis Napoleon's taking command of the allied army in the Crimea. This is, however, regarded as doubtful.

Since the siege commenced, five out of seven of the Admirals of the Russian fleet at Sebastopol have died or been killed. Cotton market steady and unchanged. Wheat and flour are lower, butquiet. Cornhas slightly advanced.

Iron is unchanged. Consuls have declined to 891. England. Parliament re-assembled on the 16th. The estimate for the expenses of the government for the year is £86,339,000 and the

evenue at £63.339. From the Seat of War. The intelligence from the allied army before Sebastopol, states that during the two first days of the bombardment, the fire of the beseigers was superior to that of the city, and much damage was done to the Russian works.

RIOT AT WOMELSDORF THE MILITARY CALLED OUT. READING, May 4, 2 P. M .- A riot has occurred among the Irish at Womelsdorf, sixteen miles north-west of this place. The rioters have burned several houses and barns. and ten to fifteen horses and mules have per-
