

> PRODUCTIVE THAN FARM FIELDS.—The Pose billty of rendering farm grounds intended for ted on by many writers. To the unreflecting farmer, their reasoning appears sound and sensible; but the difficulties in the way of se curing the promised fertility are incomprehesible. He plows deep, pulverizes thoroughly manures heavily, and yet strange to tell, be cannot succeed in producing more than tr. or, at farthest, three successive good crops of the same cereal on the same field. He finds a great deterioration, both in quantity and quality, and finally abandons the theory, with a mind fully satisfied of the impracticability of rendering his fields productive for a long succession of cereal crops of the same kind.

"All, or nearly all known plants impoverish the soil, principally during the period of their forming and maturing their seeds; and the cereal grasses owe their chief exhausting a feets to the fact of their being grown main; for the sake of their seeds."

This seeming mystery is not so difficult of so-

The products of the garden, on the other hand, are grown for a different purpose. But few are permitted to run to seed, nearly being cultivated for the succulent character of their leaves, stems or roots, and are generally removed from the soil at a stage of their growth when they earry away with them but little of the fertility which has not been drawn from the water and atm, sphere. I addition to this, gardens are much more frequently and thoroughly pulverised and ma nured than fields, intended for cereal crops. and as a consequence a greater amount of chemical action, and more complete aration are secured, after wheat is sown, but a tritling amount of further cultivation is practicable The same may be said of rye, losts, barley &c.
