ALL THE RUSSIAN OUTWORKS CAPTURED FEARFULLY BLOODY CONFLICTS.

SEBASTOPOL NOT YET ASSAULTED

Attempted Assassination of Louis Mapoleon!

NEW YORK, May 18, 1855. The Steamship Baltic arrived at this port this evening from Liverpool with dates from that city to the 6th, and news from the Crimea to the 4th instant.

By this arrival, intelligence from the Crimea informs us that all the Russian outworks at Sebastopol have been captured by the allied English and French forces.

Fearfully bloody conflicts have taken place between the Russian and allied forces, and the Russians have suffered severe losses both n killed, and prisoners taken by the allies.

No assault has yet been made on Sebastopol; but active preparations were on foot for that purpose.

An attempt was made in Paris on the 2nd nst., by an Italian to assassinate Louis Napo leon. The assassin fired twice at the Emperor; but failed in his murderous design. Personal revengeful feelings actuated the attemp

ted deed. The ruffian was arrested and in carcerated.

There is nothing of particular moment from other portions of Europe, worth Telegraphing to you. I have given you all of mportance.
