As the law, was made to restrain and no nlarge the traffic, all applications when the applicant was not engaged in the busi-ness before have been refused, for the Court cannot encourage men to embark in this busi-

ness who are out of if. The Court confined the licerse to the wholesale merchants, grocers and dealers who had already under the protection of former

The Court found it impracticable to grant scertain number of licenses to each Ward, for the reason that in some Wards there are no wholesale dealers; and this wholesale business has its locality in one or two Wards.
