



Lalest Uews. By Telegraph and Yesterday's Mails. Prohibitory Liquor Law in Indiana. The opinions of the Judges of the Sapreme Court, in the case involving the constitution. ality of the Prohibitory Liquor Law, were delivered at Indianapolis on Thursday. Justices Perkins and Davidson take grounds against: the law in toto. Justice Stuart sustained the law except so far as it relates to manufacturing, search, seizure, confiscation and sgency. Justice Goukins sustains the whole law.

Thirty-fourth Congress-Pirst Session. WASHINGTON, Dec. 18, 1855 .- SENATE .-Mr. Bayard gave notice of his intention to introduce a bill relative to the improvement of the piers at Port Penn, in the river Delaware. House .--- After some sharp-shooting in which Mr. Jones of Pennsylvania participated, in regard to Know-Nothingism, Free Soilism, etc., in Pennsylvania, Mr. Campbell of Pennsylvania said he could tell his colleague (Mr.

Jones) that he would find gentlemen here. who were not afraid of the appellation "Know Nothing," and argued to show that the American party is entirely distinct from the Free Soil party, and voted in Pennsylvania for Mr. Nicholson, as their candidate for Canal Commissioner. He and his friends were now roting for Mr. Banks for Speaker, because no man stands fairer on the American record

than he. They consider Kansas-Nebraska an open question.

Messrs Jones and Campbell of Pennsylvania then had a long dialogue about that State's politics, keeping up a spirited fire, and involving various personal explanations.

After some further controversy, Mr. Smith of Va., asked Mr. Campbell of Pa., whether Mr. Banks had not cut himself alouf from the American party.

Mr. Campbell-I do not know.

Mr. Humphrey Marshall made some observations in relation to Americanism, when the House adjourned without electing a Speaker Dec. 19.-House.-On the 65th ballot for Speaker, the vote stood as follows:


