The chief mineral productions of this country are those of coal, iron, copper, lead, and tin, which are raised in very large quantities. The United Kingdom is, moreover, noted as being the most favored country in the world for the developement of mineral industry. Fuel, the indispenable agent in the treatment of metalifferous ores and the most powerful element in the production of motive force, is distributed unequally through-out the three countries of England, Scotland and Ireland. The coal formation in these three divisions of the British empire occupies rich and widely spread basins.
