

The loss on the levies averages from ten to twelve per cent. The fips are intrinsically less valuable, although received for more than they are worth by the Government. The result will be to make the coin uncurrent everywhere, and send it eventually to the Mints for recoinage into our decimal coins. Many of the Mexican and Spanish quarters are heavy; but slightly alloyed, and are worth even more than twenty-five cents. Those having such Spanish coin in their posses sion, should not sacrifice them, as their full value can be obtained at the Mint for recoinage.

The act of Congress reducing the valuation of fees of the officers of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as they are regulated in many instances, by that coin which for many years was a legal tender. An act of Assembly however, could remove the difficulty equitably, by fixing those fees into which fine and levies enter so largely, for instance as follows :-- A 61 cents fee might be reduced to 5 cents; 121 cents increased to 15 cents; 31 cents fixed at 30 cents; 371 cents, fixed at 40 ioss to the officers of the Commonwealth. 
