The bord and pillar system will admit of various modifications to meet the demands of circumstances, to suit thick and this. veins, roofs which fall freely and floors which are subject to the creep, the cleavage of the Coal and the incitication of the veins. All these must be carefully weighed before the plan of working by bord and pillar is laid down and adapted. A vein laying at an angle of 20° or upwards, would hardly admit of being worked by any modification of bord and pillar, but it may be worked with ease to many veins laying at an angle of 10°. Semetimes the bords and headways are sat off at right angles to the direction we have supposed them, or the headways are driven level arross the incline of the vein and parallel to the winning drifts, and the bords are driven up the incline of the vein and parallel to the exploring drifts. The bords in this case are only driven from one set of winning drifts to another, but all the bords are not continued until they intersect those drifts. One to every half dozen is sufficient, merely to open a communication between the two districts. The other bords sum the short to leave a requisite strong pillar between the goal and the drifts of the adjoining district. The pillars are then commenced on the rise and worked backwards toward the winning drifts belonging to the workings of this district. Eight or ten pillars are worked back at the same time, and are kept nearly abrasat of each other until taken out. When a system of bord and piliar is adopted in a Coal mine, it is advisable to take out the piliars as soon as is practicable, after they have been opened. The piliars must be so arranged in relation to the inclination of the vein, that the Coal from the lifts of the piliars may be all conveyed down the inclination or level by the side of the piliars.

The mine may be opened into a number of districts, and each district may be similarly or differently worked by any of the systems of bord and piliar, or of long wall or long work, but it is preferable to adhere to one general method, which is best adapted to particular veins. It can easily be seen which of the modes test suits a vein by commencing the workings of the first districts opened in a vein on an experimental scale, then to adopt that proved to be the best. This simple means, which only needs a little additional care in the commencement of the works, would in a great many cases save very considerable sums in the working of the mine.
