

Their only use is to make a good road, for which they are a valuable article. But they are worth much more for agricultural purposes, and every farmer living near a village who can procure them for ther carting, should do so. They are much more estily reduced to lime than is generally supposed. Brush, turf, peat, or old roots dug up from clearings will answer a good, purpose. Pile my combustible material in a row about ten fee across, and three feet high, as compacily as posible. Upon this you may put, say fifty barter of oyster shells. Spread-them evenly, and put a smother layer of the combustibles a foot or nor in thickness. Band the sides with old inf a sods and put sods on top. Fire the heap on the windward side and with a little attention the whole mass will burn down and make a "splenti rain" for the farmer's purposes.
