Second-The rights of citisess of the United States, emigrating into ,any Federal Territory, and the power of the Federal Government, there, depend on the general provisions of the Constitution, which deduce in this, as in all other respects, the power of Con-grees. Third—As Congress does not possess power itself to make enactments relative to the perin federal territory, other than such as the Constitution confers, so it cannot constitutionally, delegate any such powers to a territorial government organized by it under the Constitution. Fourth. The legal condition of a clave in the State of Missouri is not affected by the temporary sojourn of such slave in any other State, but on his return his condition still depends on the laws of Missouri. As the plaintiff was not a citisen of Missouri, and therefore could not sue in the Courts of the United States, the suit must be dismissed for want of jurisdiction. Justice McLean and Justice Curtis dissented from the opinion of

While the decision of the Supreme Court was anticipated, in consequence of the requirements of the dominant party of the country, it of course, practically settles all the prominent point at issue between the leading political parties, of a constitutional character, relative to the question of slavery. Being the loftiest tribunal of the land, the people, the government itself, must be before the decision. The field of warfare in the future, on the question, will be transferred from the halls of Congress to the new territories of the West, where the pioneers will de cide-if Kansas offers a precedent—the matter in a practical way.
