It drives the blast for 6 furnaces, and accomplishes the work of 3 engines, formerly. No. 2 is a high pressure engine, on what is called the "compound principle." There are two cylinders, one at each end of the alternating beam, and the steam after performing its duty in the first, escapes into the second which being larger than the other, allows the steam to expand. The total power is 380 horses.
