

Mr. Wolf was on his way to the region of country, north of the mountain, when at New Columbia, a village some ten miles south of its foot, his horse becoming disabled to perform the contemplated journey, he provailed upon Mr. P. A. B. Koons, a son of the Hon. John Koons, to accompany him, using young Mr. Koons' horse. Ascending the mountain, Mr. Koons casually remarked to his companion; that "it would not be strange if we should come serous the murdarer of Norcross on our Journey." These words thus carelessly spoken, are now remembered as almost prophetic. We may here remark, that these two young men are men of peace, but of undoubted courage.
