Ventilation of Mines. The recent terrible mine explosion in Lagland, by which over 180 lives were lost in a moment, and the frequent recurrence of such casualties in the coal mines of that country, admonishes us that with the great increase of coal mining in this country the like catastrophes must be expected, if more care be not taken in laying out the workings properly in the first place as as to secure the requisite ventilation. taken in laying out the workings properly in the first place, so as to secure the requisite ventilation, and in enforcing the regulations necessary for safety amongst the miners afterwards.

The Lund Hill Colliery, where this tatal accident took place, has three shafts—an upcast or

working shaft, a pumping shaft, and one for ven-tilation. The shafts are about 40 yards distant filation. Pottaville, April 4, 1857. The quantity sent by Railroad this week is 27,-613 18-by Canal 18,176 06-for the week 45,-790 06 tons. Total by Railroad 447,849 16 against 415,461-18 tons to same period last year. The total shipments by Canal are 35,773 16 tons which is an increase. The Canal last year did not open until the fifth of April.

The quantity sent by Railroad last year for the corresponding week, was 41,610 tons-only 4000 tons less than the combined shipments of Canal and Railroad this week.

The demand for Coal continues very limited, and there is no disposition to buy except for immediate consumption. It will take at least three weeks yet to settle the trade down to any thing liko a regular business. The low prices at which some Coal has been

offered, (less than the cost of production,) keeps purchasers back; and besides, the stocks are not yet exhausted at some points. An effort is making by some parties here and at New York, to reduce the price of freight by Canal from \$1 90 to \$1 80. Several boats were loaded at this rate, one of which, we learn was bored and sunk, and another set on fire at night, but which was discovered in time to prevont any serious dumage. At Schuylkill Haven there is a very large fleet of Boats, many of which are loaded, but by some secret influence which seems to control the Boatmen, they are not permitted, or are afraid to depart, until all the shippers agree to pay \$1 90 freight to New York .-One operator, who tried to force the freight down, has apwards of twenty boats loaded which are detained. 
