

POTATO BREAD. -- A lady correspondent at the West, whom we recognize as a good writenin days. of yore, when we were schoolmates together, sends us the directions below. It may not be generally known that the starch in potatoes is a healthful and admirable substitute for "hog's fat" in making bread tender or "short," as well as sweet.
