



The two largest maple growing states are New York and Vermont, which produced upwards of ten and a quarter and six and n quarter millions of pounds, respectively. The next largest are Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Pennexception of Delaware, Florida, Mississippi and Texas, hre producers to a greater or less extent. From present indications, the quantity of mi ple aughr and melasses made this year will be

greater than ever before.
