

next pair of winning drifts on the rise by cosp of the exploring drifts. It then passes through those drifts and ventilates them in a similar manner as it did the first pair of winning drifts. Any number of drifts may be ventilated in this manner, and the air in all cases of working the whole is carried from one pair of winning drifts to another by the exploring drifts, or in some cases by urbrows or by auxiliary exploring drifts driven parallel to and at some distance from the principal exploring drifts. These suxiliary exploring drifts driven in the air courses very considerably, and they are greatly advantageous in ventilating the mine.

In working out the pillars the ventilation is much improved, because the air then takes its course part the ends of the pillars to the workings on the higher levels. In more time passes a number of winning drifts in this manner without passing back to the exploring drifts, to re-enter to the workings by way of some other or different drift to that by which it escaped, as is necessarily the case in working the whole or unbroken Coal.

The whole body of air is carried alternately through all the passages in the mine; then it is allowed to escape by way of the excending air shaft.




