

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the recitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declars. That these United Colonies are, and of right dought to be Fairs and Indexpressive States; that they are absolved form all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political concention between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliance, establish commerce, and to de all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our faviumes, and our ascred homour.

Rodman, American, has been FREE STATE CONVENTION AT TOPERA-MESSAGE OF GOV ERNOR HOBERSON.—Brief notices of the proceedings of the Free State Convention of Ransas, which met at Topeks on the Pth inst., have been published. We have now received the Message of Governor Rozinscu, from which we make the following extracts, embracing the eading points: LEADING POINTS OF GOVERNOR ROBINSON'S MESSAGE.

The policy bitherto adopted towards other new States, gives us just grounds to look to Congress for a grant of all the public lands in our midst. To your emprase and endurance its value can be traced, and to you it rightly belengs. The side of much of our most valueble lands for the behalf of the indians, give ain additional claim on the government for the remainder Strely the General Government will not seek to make a speculation on the bones and sinews of the struggling pioneers, who seek to add another State to the confedency. Let us respectfully ure upon the assembled wisdom of Congress our claim for donaison of these lands, and let us press these claims before the Government has passed its title to all the valuable portions, into the hands of speculators. No docation should, by its terms, conflict with the claim of a squatter on the soil.

The doctrine here (Governor Walker's inaugural) connectated, is only what has been established by precedent, and referated time and again. In it we have a right to form a State Constitution, and of necessity, the complete State organization, for which its specific terms must, provide.
