

Resolved by the Scale and Hours of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Panayleona, is General Assembly met. OF FUNIC MEST.
BECTER 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expen-

amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

The said staking fund may be increased, from time, to time, by dwigning to it any part of the faxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and ourrent expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the palkic debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of deliars.


