The writer, in calling on us to redress his grievances,

"It is impossible in most cases, to return the care the same day, in consequence of the Company not sending them over until 4 or 5 o'clock, P. M., which gives no time to unload and return them the same day, In. most cases the cars are not detained over air or eight hope on the West side of the Bridge; and this charge is made while they have hugdreds of cars standing idle. I am confident these charges have driven 50,000 tons of Coal off the road this season. The Coal that was formerly distributed on the line of the West Ches-ter and Media Bailroad, and taken from the Reading Railroad, is now sent by Canal to wharves at West Philadelphia where it is unloaded by Derricks and placed in cars, at a cheaper rate than it is received by Railroad with the above charges.—
