In this, however, they were disappointed—the anticipated activity of trade did not appear—and after midsummer it became apparent that the favorable results expected must be postponed until another year. This Company, furnishing the means of production and fransportation of coal, shares largely in the advarsity, as well as the success of that trade, and hence, as the season advanced, and the effects of the financial crisis became apparent; in the general proviration of business, and the destruction of corporate and private credit to an unex-

With the declining coal and general business of this Company in September last, and the total prostration of corporate and private credit, it became apparent to your Managers that the protection of your property from the hazards to which the exigencies of the first meritage bonds in the state of things unprecedented in their experience, and aware that it was not possible to dispose, in the general market without ruinous ascrifices, of any of the Company's obligations dishonored, the Board perceived that some prompt and decisive action should be taken.

The net revenue from Coal Rents this year is \$26,917 ter than last year, although the quantity of Coal rated over the Road is 88,000 tons less than last year. These increased rents have accrued under the new EVENEUS OF leaves.

The profits of the road have been equal to a dividend of 7 per cent., but like many others, the Managers have concluded to pass the dividend for the purpose of arranging their floating liabilities. More faith than your friend possesses can lead him to conclude that your policy can be effectually adopted.

"Again you argue, the healthiness of the trade depends upon routing out all the Middle Mon form."

"Again you argue, the healthiness of the trade depends upon routing out all the Middle Men from Richmond, and giving wharves to the miners alone. Your reason is, that the mixing of Coal there has prejudiced the reputation of Schuylkill County Coal. Undoubtedly, there is great trath on this point. And true it is, that the trade abroad are seeking out those who mine, ship, and thus handle their own Coal, for which they are willing to pay a remunerating price. But suppose the Railroad Company nward their wharves to miners exclusively—with 20 wharves, how can the same variety of Coal be received there and shipped as production from 100 mines without anipped as production from 100 mines without mixing, and will not the same capidity control those miners having the wharves, as now possess the Middle Men. Let the Middle Men buy the "trash" and mix with the good in the proportion of 6 to 1, and sell accordingly. Undoubtedly they make the money; but it is one of those many evils in trash that cures trasf. evils in trade that cures itself.

"Let the trade know who mine and ship their own Coal. Let such advertise the same in the real, then we can see if purchasers will avail hemselves of its advantages. We give the above as the views of a dealer with regard to Coal Credits, &c.: We desire discussio on the subject. We did not recommend a cust usiness, which we know cannot be carried out but merely shortening the credit system. Coal is a perishable article—every time it is handled it loses,-and three-fourths of all the material that

And besides, those who could not sell their Coal to Richmond Dealers have the Canal as an outlet for their Coal.
