SENATOR CAMEROX AND THE LECOMPTON CONSTITUTION.—
There has been a disposition on the part of the friends of Sonator Cameron to censure him for not voting on the Lecompton bill, but pairing off with Fenator Davis, of Mississippi. In reply to a letter addressed to him by the septior editor of the Harrisburg Telegraph, on the subject, Mr. Cameron has written the following letter in explanation. The sentiments contained in it do honor to the head and heart of our distinguished Senator; and after a perusal, there can be no disposition on the part of any of his personal or political friends to censure him for the course which both justice and friendship prompted him to pursue:

WASHINGTON CITT, March 28, 1858.

WASHINGTON CITY, March 28, 1858. My Dear Sir:—Your kind letter of the Zeth has been received.

My "friends in and out of the Legislature," you say, "censure me for pairing off with a sick man who, they say, could not be there."

I certainly would have been censurable if it were true that Col. Davia could not have been present to vote; but such is not the fact. He had determined to come to the Senate, against the advice of his physician, and not with standing the fours of his family. To prevent him from doing so, a mutual friend came to me with an appeal. It was a bad day; I had been on intimate terms with him since I entered the Senate in 1845, and I could not hesitate to do an act of grace to a friend, knowing that the result could in no manner be affected by the loss of a vote on each side, while my refusal might endanger increased could in no manner be affected by the loss of a vote on each side, while my refusal might endanger his life; and believing too, that I had character enough won in the contest thus far, to do a good act without incurring the censure of good men.

While I have omitted no exertion to defeat this "Lecompton swindle," and while I shall faithfully and zealously act with my party for the common good of my country, I will not permit myself to be one inch behind my opponents in the courtesies and civities which deprive politics of their hardness, and invite men of kindly feelings into the service of the State, where such courtesies will produce no injury to the public. I prefer, greatly the grace of the infidel Safadin, in carrying, at the risk of his own life, to the tent of his foeman, the proud Cour De Leon—the fallemant-which restored his health, to the Scottish reformers who killed the persecuting Arch Bishop on his road to church, rather than let him live and repent.
