This was a great invention, by nid of which the utility of money was so much fa-creased, that a single thousand pieces could be done by hundreds of thousands. tion. When money is flowing in, every than is ena-bled to find a purchaser for his labor, and to become a purchaser of that of others. Therefore has it been, that commerce has so steadily increased in

these countries in which the Californian and Australian products have so rapidly accumulated Autatian products nave to rapidly accumulated — France, Germany, and notthern and western Europe generally. When, on the contrary, money flows out, the circulation diminishes, and laber is everywhere wasted. That labor-power being cap-ital, the result of the consumption of other capi-tal, in the form of food, all the difference between an education and the declining state of excision in and silver, and causes them to be exported.
