If we eat our mmediate profit is greater, the rich wheat kernel will soon become a shriveled concern, as unlike its neestor as a crab is to a pippin. By cultivation, all our choice varieties of apple have been produced from the wild crab of Asia-by neglect, they will return to that again. Our best varieties of peach have been, by cultivation, produced from a fruit of Persia, that possessed, in its whole mass, the poisonous property that is now in the seed; and a person enting some of the rich, pulpy varieties of pears, can hardly imagine that it is a descendant of what Pliny described eighteen hundred years ago, when he said, "all pears whatsoever, are but a heavy meat, unless they be well boiled or baked." While such has been the progress forward, of many of the fruits, others have greatly deteriorated, or progressed backward. Not long since,

> some wheat kernels were found in the cuffin of one of the Gallic kings, who had been buried fourteen hundred years. The wheat, in its hotenical character, is identical with the wheat of the present day; and yet, on being planted, it produced from sixteen to twenty stalks to each grain, and had an average of twenty more grains to a stalk, and each grain heavier than our common wheat. This shows that wheat culture has dwarfed the crop in the last fourteen centuries so as to almost make the plant a different species; and every year's cropping is making it less, and less likely that we shall keep even the present deteriorated artiole good without constant care and skill in the use of fertilizers, and in the relection, of seed. The descendants of vegetables, as well as of an-

imals are the representatives of their ancestors. If consumption, scrofula, or other disease exists in the parent, it will appear in the children and though it may sometimes pass over a single generation, it is sure to appear in the next. It is so with vegetables: sow peas, full of bugz, and you will get buggy peas; sow wheat, full of weevil and smut, and you will reap a rich erop of weevil and smut; sow shriveled and late ripened wheat, and it will require a miracle to produce a good

In the retrograding scale, the descendants are always worse than the parents. In the human race, avarice in the sparent makes a thief of the child—the principle is inherited, but is more fully developed. So in all animals and vegetables .-The bad traits in the parents, are inherited by the offspring, and more fully developed. Deteriora. tion thus goes on, in an accelerated ratio, untilwe can scarcely trace a resemblance to the ances-

Let every farmer, then, conscientiously resolve never to allow a good article to deteriorate on his hands; but, by taxing the forces of Nature, to Improve whatever is entrusted to his care. Let him resolve, not only to compel the earth to yield her increase in abundance, but that the abundance shall be improved in quality. Ohio Farmer.

GAPES IN CHICKENS .- The disease is often caused by feeding too liberally with wet Indian meak when confined in the coop. Chickens that are permitted to roam freely through the fields are seldom troubled with the disease. The common . Tucket or pop corn, is botter than-smeal with which to feed chickens, as soon as they are four

weeks old. TREATMENT OF ITCH .-- Dr. Schubert, of Gernany, treats all cases of itch by washing the patient with plenty of soft soap and salt in water Eight ounces of soap and four of salt to one quart of water, make a pretty sharp bath, but he says it will cure the majority of cases in three or four MEAD. - This favorite beverage that for centa-

ies was the chief libation of northern gations, is made by dissolving one part of honey in three of boiling water, flavoring it with spices, and adding a portion of ground malt, and a piceof of tourt steeped in yeast, allowing the whole to sement. REMEDY FOR THE HOVEN .- Cattle pasturing on clover in a wet state, are apt to become bloated; I have relieved them in a short time by straply placing a straw band in their mouth as a bit, and tying it over the head. In their emicarory to get it out the wind is expelled from the stemach. plants, and throw them away. This is said to be effective.

REMEDY FOR LINE ON CALVES.—Take some low priced oil, put some Scotch snuff in it, and oil the animal along the backbone from head to tail, and also a streak around the neck an inch or two wide. Two or three applications will expel them. To CURE THE SICK HEADACRE. Two temporafuls of finely powdered charcool, drauk in hilf s tumbler of water, will often give relief to the sick headache, when caused, as in most cases it is, by superabundance of acid on the stemach. TO RELIEVE CHOARED CATTLE.—My plan is to fire a gun under the animal, when the animal makes such a desperate spring that the wind from the stomach throws out the obstruction in the throat at once.
