PENNSTLVANIA'S DIFFICULTIES. In vain the so called Democratic press of the State endeavors to stem the tide setting strongly now in favor of administrative reform. Equivocation, faisehood and the raising of false issues have had their day. The People undoubtedly, were deceived by the statements of stump orators. and the Democratic press in 1844, that James K. Polk was a better Tariff man than Henry Clay; but the game has been fully played out. The People recognize that the bitterest enemy to the industrial pursuits of the county, is the Sham Democratic party. The breeze that old Pennsylvania will raise next Fall about Democratic cars, will we fancy, be more forcible than agreeable. They will be saught the losson that the interests of our working classes are not to be neglected with impunity. While we contemplate this result with interest, the painful conviction forceasitself upon our mind' that unless the sweep in Fennsylvania is most thorough; unless the sweep in renewy with its most thorough; unless we show other sections that we utterly repudiate the policy of the Democratic party, that it is extremely doubtful whether Penn-sylvania will be enabled to obtain that Protection for Iron which she needs. 
