RAGS.—The importation of rags for the purpose of papermaking is a great deal more extensive than most persons would imagine. During the year 1857, we imported 44,882,080 lbs., valued at \$1,448,125, and making 69,461 bales; 35,591 bales were from Italy, and more than one-third are entirely linen, the rest being a mixture of lin-en, the rest being a mixture of linen and cotton. About 2,000 bales were also imported from the free cities of Hamburg and Bremen. France pro-hibits the exportation of rage, and so does Rome; the few which we get from Ancona (a Roman pro-vince) being by special permission on payment of large fees. Prussia and Germany generally imlarge fees. Prussia and Germany generatiy impose so high an export duty on rage as lostop the
trade entirely. The exports from Alexandria and
Smyrna are chiefly collected in Asia Minor by
agents having license from the government, and
the domestic demand must be supplied before any
can be exported. It is the same with Trieste,
where only the surplus is allowed to come away. The Trieste rage are collected all over Hungary. We are informed that New York and Boston recoive the largest quantity, and the place that ships the most is Leghorn in Italy.

JAMES BUCHLNAM DISCOVERY IN THE MANUFACTURE OF LEATERS. The Ohio Farmer montions an "important discovery" in the manufacture of leather, by which the process of tanning is performed in as many days as it formerly required months. Leather, it is known, is formed by the union of gelatin, of which the is formed by the union of gelatin, of which the akin is chiefly composed, and tannin, a substance found in the bark of the oil, bemlock and hirely, and in a few shrubs like the sumac, &c. For tanning purposes immense breadths of forest have already been destroyed, and the supply of tannin steadily decreases, while the demand for leather, increases. Many mineral and vogetable substances have been tried as substitutes, but without success, and tanners are now obliged to import hemlock from a great distance and at a constantly increasing cost.
