

A FEW PLAIN PACTS.

The closing session of the Thirty Fifth Congress commences on Monday, the 6th day of Derember next. The President has been for some time busy preparing his Mesmer, and the Secretaries of the soveral Departments with their annual reports. Constituted as this Congress it, and being also, the last phe, at far as the lower House is concerned, over which Mr. Buchanan can bring the influence of his party dictatorship to bear with any decisive effect, there is good reason to supports that the Executive Message will very fully and distinctly lay down the programme of operations on which the Administration relies to retrieve in some measure, its lost position with the people. A desperate effort will whilebiedly, be made in the Message, not only to gloss over the unfortunate past, but to strike out sobe bew and startling course for the future, which shall divert public attention from the disestrous record. We might shticipate much that the Administration will in all probability, advance as orthodox Democratic doctrine, and as confine surselves to a point of great importance vania and sister States, but to the home of New Bogland, the Western sgriculturist, the cotton planter of the South, the shipping, and in fact, every interest dependant upon the developin our vast internal resources. equate Protection of our domestic industry. For many years it has been a favorite theory of the Democratic party, that the country would be most prosperous under a Free Trade policy ; Demueratle Administrations and Congresses baye again and again recommended and passed Tariff bills looking alone to revenue and not to Protection, and even the forthcoming Message of Mr. Buchanan, may, not, depart from the beaten path of custom. If it should, we shall be agreeably surprised. But preinising that it will not we have some facts to place before our readers, which may guard them against sophistry and unfounded as. sertions. It is better to articipate intelligently, than to receive ignorantly.

In the first place then it has not only been af firmed by the Democratic party, but has been car ried out in practice by that party when it has been in power in this country, that the Projective systen is incompatible with the best interests and prosperity of the country ; the principles of Free Trada being, in its estimation, no less expedient in practice than conformable to the maxims of a wise theoretical economy. 
