der a pressure of seventy pounds. He then heated the boiler red hot, and stood by it while thirty gallons of cold water were pumped into it. No explosion took place. Subsequently, he used every exertion to blow it up, but could not sucched. The means of preventing an explosion, is traly, simplicity itself, bring nothing more nor less, than an insulated metalic rod passing into

the boiler with a number of points on the rod to collect the vast amount of electricity constantly gonerated by the ebulition of water. From the top of rod on the autride of the boiler, Mr. Parry had a wire passing into the ground. This plan o preventing boiler explosions was so novel at the United States Patent Office, that the officers refased to entertain it. They admitted that some. thing besides steam was the cause of boiler explosion ; but they would not believe that any man, who witnessed the experiment. A patent was foally granted, and the Office endorsed Mr. Parry as being right in every particular.

Our readers may convince themselves of the ectness of Mr. Parry's theory, by simple exeriments in their homes. For instance, take two amblers, perfectly cold. Pour hot water into one and it will crack instantly. Put a bright silver oon into the other glass, and it can be filled

ith perfect safety to it. Scientific men 'assert ibatche giass breaks from sudden expansion, as cat and cold do not agree. Mr. Parry says that he action of two extremes, such as heat and cold, roduce a sudden charge of electricity. The glass being a non-conductor, in the one case, it is broken by the charge or shock, which cannot esgape. In the other, the spoon being a conductor, the electricity passes off, and the hot water on comes red hot, a similar plan will save it. Final-
