BLACK QUARTER, OR QUARTER EVIL. Some eight or pine years ag. I first saw this disease, and for five years saw more or less of it. This malady seems to have three times in the year in which is provails the most-aithough young stock, that are in bigh redition, labork, are liable to it at any time-but April, June and August are the months that I saw it meet. My experience is this :- The disease commenced among my father's stock in August-weather hat. and showery-feed very abundant. All that was done to prevent was change of pasture, feed; ing plenty of salt with brimstone and saltpetre. Lost some eight or ten head of the best stock, under two years old. The next year it commenced about the same time, and two died. Procured a fleam, and bled all stock under two years old-no more died, por were any additional attacked,-Next year, in April, one was attacked with itbled all again, also again in August. The two following years, bled in April and August. Lost no more cattle, although our neighbors that did not bleed, suffered from its ravages. This had made me firm in the belief that bleeding is a preventive, and if I were raising stock now, I should bleed and give good feed, rather. Than to serimp for fear of the melady. Think it is almost impossible to oure after the swelling is large, and impossible when it is scated internally. Have seen them die within three hours after being so attacked; would not be bloated in the least; flesh would look as clean and nice as though butchered, but intestines, lungs, &c., would be black and frothy. | Never saved the life of but one, and that was the last we ever had attacked with it. We fellowed Mr. Youatt's plan as near as we could, Noticed it by the animal not eating his mess, and kicking slightly, as though his foot itched. Examined his leg, and found a slight swelling in the

thin part of the leg above the gambrel jointenough, however, to give the crackling noise .-Commenced operations immediately-aved his life, but he lost the shell of his hoof. Fatted, and killed it in the fall. As farmers canot always be with their stock to ratch them-and if discovered, scarcely have the remedies at hand, or patience to doctor them. if they had-I think an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Every one that has a common ileum laucet, or sharp pocket knife, and luck enough to use them, has the preventive; and bleeding does no hurt, but good. Some think cutting the tail or an ear will do, but I think it;

hould always be done in the neck, and the blood pe caught in a measure, so as to ascertain-the; mount taken, which should depend on age, size, and condition of the animal. Those that are thin of flesh, are liable to it if put on good feed-have seen those quite thin, but the world, die as well as those more fleshy.

dy will not prevail at all ; but, as a safe guard, I would bleed, and if the disease once made its appearance among my stock, I should certainly do so. It is less trouble and expense than feeding drugs, and I think more reliable. What makes

A WINTER CROP OF OATS OR SALAD .- There' is a very pretty experiment which we have frequently seen young people interested in, showing very seeds throw out their roots and stalks. It is this Take a tumbler with smooth sides, so that you can see through it clearly, and fill it nearly full with water; on the water lay some cotton plant and s,few oats. In a few days they will have swelled,

and then a little white root will throw itself downward and a small green shoot will show itself. which gradually, day after day, will grow till they reach quite a large size. Water must be added requently as the plants grow. On the same principle, if you take a large plate r platter, and spread cotton-wool or a piece of blanket in it; and sow lettuce seed, you may raise enough for several dishes of salad. It should be kept in a warm, dark closet till the seeds have sprouted, and then the water always kept abund-

antly supplied. After the sends have fairly sprouted they should be brought into the light, and they will soon grow to a mass of green plants, which will be quite ornamental, and, if they are not used for anything else, they will, in their fresh, green looks, well repay the little trouble of keeping the Recipes.

BROWN BETTY--Take two dozen fine-large ap-

ples, and cut them into thin sliges, pare them'if preferred, but it is not necessary. Cramb up a loaf of stale bread.
