HISTS ON CLEARING WOODLANDS. While fully endorsing the repeated protests of the Agriculturist against the universal destruction of forest trees, it is to be admitted that there are times when woodlands should be cleared. A farmer may keep, on an average, one-sixth of his land permanently in time ber, and yet clear off a portion every en or fifteen years. It is often recommended to cut out only the old-and decaying trees in a wood lot, leaving the younger to grow and fill their place. But experience has now pretty well shown that the best way is to cut off the entire growth at once, clean and smooth, and then let the trees sprout up again from the roots, or from new planting.
