

A liberal tone characterizes this document throughout. It permits the introduction of the Christian religion into the ports of Simoda, Hakodadi, Nangasaki and Desima.

European News. We are in possession of Liverpool dates to the 26th ult. It is all settled that a new telegraphic Atlantic cable is to be laid, to be ommenced immediately, the British Government having agreed to guaranty eight per ceht, interest on the capital of £600,000 to be invested. Lord Cowley, the English Am-bassador at Paris, had gone on a special mis-sion of conciliation to Vienna. Ministers had announced in Parliament that there was reason to hope that the Austrian and French troops would soon evacuate Rome. The British Government had offered a subsidy of £3,000 per voyage to the Galway line. Lord Lyons, the new British Ambassador to the United Status, sailed for New York on the 22d, in the steam frigate Curacoa. In the cotton market at Liverpool there was increased activity. The Liverpool breadstuffs market was dull but steady.
