It also establishes the fact that no State in the Union of equal extent compares with Ohio in all the elements of prosperity and greatness.

The appraised value of towns and cities is \$153,102,815; of lands, \$437,183,132, and of chattel property, \$250,514,084, making an aggregate of \$840,800,031. Within the past seven years the aggregate value has nearly doubled. The State debt of Ohio is a little over sixteen millions, and a tax of two cents on the dollar would more than pay it off. The exports of Ohio for 1858 (aside from manufactures) amounted to \$50,350,000. Of this amount, Flour and Wheat, not-
