28 Major W. A. Nichole, U. S. Army.-With leasure we copy from the Charleston Mercury of April 19th last, an extract of the proceedings of the anniversary banquet of the Charleston Light Dragoons, on the lat of that month. The banthe South Carolina Militia-and we observe that our townsman, Major Nichole, U. S. Army, was a guest, and was honored on the occasion by the following sentiment, proposed by Captain B. If. Rutledge, the commandant of the Dragoons, who introduced Major Nichols to the company with the following historical memoranda: "Major Nichols served at the storming of Mon-

terey, siege of Vera Crus, Cerro Gordo, San Antonio, Charabarco, Mulino del Rey, Chapaliepee, Parita san Cosme, and City afterwards. "Being a First Lieutenant of artillery, he was "Being a First Lieutenant or artitlery, as was brevetted Captain for 'gallant conduct' at Monter-ey; was reported 'distinguished' at Churubuseo, and was again brevetted Major for gallant con-duct at 'Molino del Roy.'

The incident having reached the ears of the President, he sent to the War Department to learn the name of the officer who had thus distinguished fore examining the reports." To which Major Nichols, who was received with cheers, responded:
