Low freights have also much to do with it.— For instance, Morris, Tasker & Morris, the Thursday well known iron firm of Philadelphia, recently received at that port a quantity of iron from Liverpool, upon which they paid a freight of \$1 25 per ton. To transport the same quantity of iron from Pottaville to Philadelphia would cost \$2 80 per ton, freight. Another Philadelphia firm also recently received from Liverpool, a quantity of hides, upon which they paid \$2 75 per toil, freight. To send the same from Pottsville to Philadelphia, would cost \$4 40 per ion, freight. If in a distance of only ninety four miles, with canal law. and railway ficilities, the American manufacturer cannot even approach successful competition with the foreign manufacturer, located at a distance of three thousand miles, what can the American manufacturer, at even a greater distance from market than we are, expect to effect?
