We never let thisttles, burdocks, and other noxious weeds, go to seed on our premises; the boards are not off from our barns, and unsightly rubbish don't accumalate on our premises-(this may be slightly/exaggerated, but we will assume it for argument sake). ur cattle are net poorly fed; our plowing is not of the "cut and cover" kind, and our planting is not out of time. We are therefore the men to exort others to the performance of duty.

Will you not then, this Spring, go into a general clearing up about your fences and buildings f the cunsightly accumulations which have annoyed your wife and daughters so long, and in your more susceptible moments brought a very lutla color into your own cheeks? If that old hay rack is worth anything, would it not pay to carry taway to some shelter? If it is fit for wood, suppore you burn it in doors, and if not, burn it somewhere. Ditto the horse rake, plow, old sled,

old wagon, and cultivator. Are you through with those plum trees, covered with black knots and dead limbs ?-then, for your country's sake, if not for your own, burn them or by all means, kill or care them. Circumnusigate your whole form and if you find in muy fence corner a good rail, put it on the

fence; and if you find stumps, stones, broken rails, or bushes, put them out of the way.
