ALEXANDER VON HUMBOLDT. The death of this illustrious man in his ninetieth year, is an event which falls sadly upon the beart of the world. Ile was a man old in years, yet with a wind young and unfouched by time; great, yet unconscious of his greatoess ; illustri-

ous, yet simple. Frederick Henry Alexander, Baron Von Humboldt, was born at Berlin, September 14, 1769 .---Ilis father, Major Von Hamboldt, who had been on officer in the service of Frederick the Great, died in 1779. Alexander Von Humboldt was educated parily at the university of Frankfort-on-the Oder, and partly at Goettingen; at which latter he had the benefit of the instructions of Heyne and Blumerbach. In his university vacations he usde scientific excursions along the Rhine and Into the Hars Mountains, the result of which was his first work, published in 1790, entitled "Mineralogical Considerations on certain basaltic formathe celebrated Werner. In 1792 he was appointed to an office connected with the mining department under the Prussian government, and lived at Bayrauth. Here he remained till 1795. The daties of his official position did not interfore

with the ardent, pursuit of scientific knowledge. Besides contributing scientific articles on various subjects to German periodicals, he wrote and published a work on botany, in the Latin language. He had always felt a strong desire for foreign travel; and on the death of his mother, in 1796, ha determined to gratify it. The troubled state of Esrope interposed many obstacles to his plan ; and while waiting for the realization of his hopes he published a work on the process of life in the animal and vegetable world, and another on subterranean gas. A plan for visiting upper Egypt in 1798 was reluctantly abandoned after having been ardently embraced. In the same year he made at Paris the acquaintance of Bonpland, a young man inspired, like himself, with the love of travel and the love of science. They schemed a journey into the love of science. Through the Minister Urquijo, he gain-ed access to the King of Spain; and was fortunate enough to secure his interest and co-operation in a proposed visit to Maxico and South America.-The wo friends set sail from Coronas on the 5th of Jane, 1799, in a Spanish corvette, the Pisarro; and exception the Singlish cruisers, got out to sea. THE WAB IN ITALY. We make up from our late foreign files the following interesting extracts: The Amstriam Generals. General Gyalal, how the actual governor of the Austriam for latiliam provinces, and commander-in-chief of the froogs in all Lombardo-Fenella, was, in 1848, a simple general of brigade.
