

No battle has occurred.

The English government has formally proclaimed its neutrality in the European War.

The Emperor's departure from France was a perfect ovation, and his reception at Geoog, where he arrived on the 12th, was most cordial.

His address to the army enjoined the strickest discipline, and stated that his only fears were that they would show too much enthusiasm. He was expected to proceed to the army on the 14th. The King of dardinia wisited the Emperor at Genea.

The official Sardinian builetins continued to report retrograde movements by the Austrans, whose headquarters were at Robbio, which is about midway between Vercelli and Moriara.

It is said that more than double the amount of the five hundred nillion france, as war loan, had been subscribed for, and that three times the sum might be had for the same pulpose. The Empresa had already transacted business and was to hold weekly reviews of the National Guard. The gun-basts are not to be employed, but five fricates were to be immediately prepared for sea. The Paria Pays says that the depredations committed by Austria, in Piedmont, are for the purpose of filing the military storehouses of Lombardy. They are literally stripping the Piedmonts provinces of hay, grain provisions, and everything they can carry off; and, as cording to the French journals, they do this with the greatest right and states that Rear Admiral Jeurieu de Lagravière had left denoa in the Algesiras for the Adrialic, to give notice to the military authorities that the ports of the Austrian coast, are in a state of blockade.

It is provided, amongst other things, that the volunteers will be liable to be called out in rate of actual isvanion, or the appearance of an enemy in force on the east, or in case of rebellion arising out of either of these emergencies; and that, while thus under arms, the volunteers will be subject to military law.

A war amplement of the official London Genetic of May 13, contains a royal proclamation, which declares her Majesty at peace with all sovereigns, and powers, and States, and firmly determined to abstant altogether from taking any part, directly or indirectly, in the war between Austria and Sandinia and France; and her Majesty's subjects are commanded to observe a strict neutrality. The proclamation then proceeds to point out the various acts in violation of neutrality which are to be guarded against.

The London Sur agrues that England, by declaring her neutrality in a struggle, the only avowed object of which has violation of Treaties; confesses that the treaties of Vienna are not, worth fighting about, and gives them up altogether.

Turns, May I ith.—The enemy (the Austrians,) are investing their forces near the castle of St. Govanni, on the road from Piacensa to Stradella. They have constructed bridges near Vigovano and Motta Visconti to protect their retreat. To-day our soldiers pushed forward, in a strong reconnotiering party as fay as Cascine di Stra, near Vergelli, and our military tegan cannonaling the enemy, which, however, was not replied to.—Our troups have taken the
