

The Steamship America at Halifax. Three Days Later From Europe. NO BATTLE YET.

The Austrians Retreating—Headquarters at Gar-The Austrians Retreating—Headquarters at Gar-lasco-Vercelli occupied by the Allies—Emperor of Austria on His Way to the Seat of War— Blockade of Anstrian Ports—Reported Euro-pean Alliance against France—The English Elections—Ministerial Gain of Toenty-Three-Later From India—Execution of Tantia Topes —Death of Commissioner, Yeh—Cotton and Breadetuffe Lower.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Jame 2.—By the arrival of the horse express from Halifax, we are placed in possession of the foreign intelligence received at that port, last evening, by the steamhlip America.

The America left Liverpool at half past 11 e'clock, A. M., ou Saturday, the 31st uit.

The latest news from the seat of war status that no collision had occurred, but that the positions of the troops were such that a battle might be aspected at any moment. Retrograde morements were still the order of the day with the Austrian troops, the head-quarters of which had been removed to Carlesco, a point not more than ten miles distant from the Ticho river, and about tweety miles from Pavis.

There was a vague report that the Emperor of Austria, accompanied by Gen. Hers, had reached Milan, and had departed from thence on the route to Pavis. It was expected that the Austrian troops would remain inactive until the Emperor reached head-quarters to asquee the command. until the Emperor research and the Emperor research and the Liverpool Past publishes, on what it calls reliable information, that the passage of the Ticino by the French troops will be the signal for a European milance against France, and for the Austrian troops to march on against France, and for the Austrian froops to march on Paris.

The bulletins from the sest of war are unimportant. All the cinnnels to the Venitian capital are blocked up, and all the jorts on the Adriatic are blockeded by French squadrous, a large number of vessels being engaged in enforcing a strict blockade.

The elections in England for members of the House of Commons were concluded, and the ministrial papers claim that the Derby party has been strengthesed by the addition of twenty-three members.

The overland mail from India supplies Bombay dates to the 26th of April, and later advices from China.

The insurgent Tuntia Topec had been tried, sentenced, and executed. The death of the former Uniness Commissioner Teh is announced.

At Bombey exports were artire and imports firm.

The War.

Prior to the retreat from Vyrcelli, the Austrians continued their exactions on the inhabitants, filling them with constraint, as they were not in a condition to satisfy the demands.

During the night of the 17th, a party of 100 Austrians escaladed the bridge at Valenza, through a breach, and made a fruitless attempt to take it.

The official Sardinlan bulletin says that the Austrians occupy the right bank of the Po, as far as the Castle of San Glovanni, with 12,000 troops.

The fortifications on the bridge at Stella, for the purpose of protecting the retreat of the Austrians, are continued.

Our troops occupied Vercelli this afternoon.
