constitution was adopted on the 9th inst. The vote by which it was ratified has surprised and bothered everybody. The aggregate vote was something less than one-sixth of the number of legal voters in the State. It may be set down at 35,000. The majority for the amendment was about 6,000, or about twenty-five per cent., judg-ing from the returns from 273 towns, which left only 57 towns to be heard from. The vote of Boz-ton was as comparatively small as that of any city or town. At the State election, in Navember the 9th inst., there were only 6,014 votes cast. In November Mr. Brach, the democratic candidate. for governor, headed the list, in the city, having

On the amendment the vote stood, 3,518 for it, to 2,405 sgainst it, being less than one-half of the Demu-cratic vote six months ago.
