

It is a noticeable fact that of late years the insect pests of the garden and orchard are increaring to an alarming extent, and the ravages they commit upon fruit trees and fruit may well nigh lead the fruit culturist to despair of success .-Plumy, nectarines, and apricots; have almost disappeared, owing to the ravages of the curculio. Good cherries, even, are becoming scarce. Apples and Pears are too often worth enten and vorthless. Grapes, though comparatively free from insects or diseases, as yet, are to the multitule as sour as they were to the fox in Acop'A fable. The intect and vermin destroyers of our field crops are also becoming more numorous every year. On the other hand, insectiverous hirds, designed to keep them in check, are wantonly do-

stroyed by man. What if the birds do occasionally: pick a cherry or?a strawberry? It will be generally found that they take only those centaining the larve of some insect. Instead of destroying the birds would it not be better to look up me them as the best friends of the farmer and gardener, and to encourage their presence aming us by leaving them to enjoy the short period of life allotted to them, unharmed by the fewler's gun or the nest-robbing proclivities of recreant schoolbiys or lazy loafers? Well may the cultivator be content to allow the tribute of a few of his smaller fruits to the watchful guardians of his trees and crops.

We give descriptions of a few of the more im. portant and useful of these birds, mainly derived from an excellent article by C. N. Bement, in the Rural Annual for 1858.

The Barn Oul .- This queer-looking but useful bird affords an instance of mistaken persecution. We often see his careass nailed to the barn dier, Yet he destroys and feeds upon the rate, mice, and other vermin that infest the birm and the harvet fields. Farmers are upt to suppose that because the owl resorts to the barn, he destroys the eggs and young of their pigeons and fowle; but he merely socks repose and concealment during the glare of daylight.

The Blackbird is the avowed enemy of all grobs, and may be seen in large flocks in a recentlyplowed field, industriously searching for these vermin. Not content with a superficial hearth on the surface, he pokes about with his bill to the depth of several inches, to discover the worms. The Phiebe Bird is a sociable little fellow, and generally builds his nest in the perch or undar the envel. They arrive early in the spring, ind the first chirp sends ighalness through the house, as it is a sure sign that the severe frosts are ended, and the gardener may resume his labors with confidence. They feed on flies and verious wall insects.

The Wren is another nice, sociable little biel, and destroys vart numbers of insects. An observ that one pair of wrens went forth to bring fool to their postlings; and he says they unver returned without an insect in their hills. This perpetual firing forth and returning is repeated from morning till night, and continged till the young birds are able to fly forth themselves ; and ever if they once in a while nip a strawberry or a charry, no person will grad them it as the himest due of their services. The Chick a dee is a great favority of all-ac-

tive, noisy, and restless. Hardy, and espaire of bearing the severest old, on still winter days hi may be seen hopping from tree to tree, exumining every twig, branch an I crevine in the back, for insects and their larves. Nothing can exceed his cheerfulness or his industry. The Creeper is a frequent communion of the chick-n-den, but confines his search to grubs that are concealed in the wood of the tree. The Colar or Cherry Bird is generally no favorite with the fruit-grower, from his frequent at tacks upon the cherries. But in mitigation of Bis crime of plundering the cherrise, a ruce t ritor observes :- "While watching the little reedls plundaring my fruit, I noticed that they are disturbed a sound charry, but took only those that had worms in them. Since then I have not allowed them to be destroyed, and non satisfied that bey never take the sound fruit." The Cat-Bird .- Few people in the country respect the ext-hird. He is generally, an object of dislike, from his fondness for cherries and straw-
