We cannot violate man's statute against the same, without being liable to a penalty.

Apart however, from any consideration of this nature, we think that Sunday travel is demoralising, notally and physically. In the end no employee of a railway or other company, is a gainer, in beilth or purse, by working on Sunday, and higher than they were last year when the Govern we believe that the history of every company that has run Sunday trains, will show that the plan has proved a dead loss. Gloucester has borne an unenviable reputation in that respect; and the authorities have but to permit the Sunday passenger cars to run, to render the new Fairmount Park equally as objectionable to the respectable. Under a clamor for the comfort of the working classes, which has no foundation in fact, the present is an attempt-nided by a few reckless; journals-by a railway corporation to make money by a systematic descention of the Sabbath.

We believe therefore, that Sunday travel, which compels the employment of labor, is not only illegal but uncalled for; we believe that no company nor individual is a gainer in the end by working on that day; we can prove that where a railway company makes one dollar by runnings trains on the Sabbath, it loses two; and we can point to the Schuylkill Navigation Company which since it has stopped boats running on to line on Sunday, has been palpably, the gainer, in a pecuniary point of view.

The attempt in Philadelphia, will we trust, be defeated. It is not solely a local matter. The principle in any, result, will extend throughout the State, and we wish to see a decision in the matter which will be an index to our moral progress. If cars are to clatter through the streets of our cities on the Subbath, why then, open shops and thentres, and close churches, for those who patronize the care will make that their next demand. We should be cautious in our innovations.
