Take an example,-Here is a corn field planted in rows and hille three by four feet, which allows 3,630 hills to the sere Estimating the yield on a good soil, with all the hills perfect, at 56 bushels per sere, we have alout a pint of corn to the hill. But suppose we have 62 hills (one in every 60) deficient, there will then be a loss of one bushel of corn, with ne less labor in preparing the ground and in the after cultivation, for the weeds should be heed down on the vacant spots.
