

It is by no means settled yet, whether manures should be applied to the surface of the ground, or be plowed under at once; nor whether they should be used fresh, or in a perfectly fermented state. By many it is hold that manure always descends into the soil, especially by leaching, and therefore that it should be placed on the surface Others hold that the volutile and most valuable parts always rire, in the process of fermentation and that therefore the manure should be buried

Now, is there not a little truth and a little ercor on both sides? Manure is less of paraveler than is sometimer supposed; it stays pretty near where it is put. On cleaning out one's barn sard in the Spring, the soil is found discolored beneath the piles of manure only a few inches in depth -Then again, we may cover putrifying offal with only fope or five inches of dirt, and the offensire odors will all be absorbed. If lumps of manure are buried in the soil in the Spring, and not pulver ised and mixed with the surrounding earth, they will be found in the same place in the Path, and with little change of condition. If we make's composithesp of one third manure and two-thirds muck, or half manure and half muck, the soluble and volitile parts will all be retained within the

bounds of the comport.

It is held by very many intelligent and practic soil. The other portions of the manure not being are taken up by the growing plants just as fast a manure and its intimate diffusion throughout the soil are matters of the highest importance. John Johnston, near Geneva, one of the best farmers in this State, applies his manure generally upon the surface of his land, and that in a half fermental state. On grass fields intended for corn the next year, he sprends it on the surface in September, letting it lie undisturbed until the following April or May, when it is plowed under. He holds that the soluble parts give the grass a heavy grouth; and the other parts when plowed in improve the texture of the soil. For wheat, he applies his manure at the time of sowing, or just before, and

harrows it in. We have romewhere met with the published pinion of Dr. Vocckler, an eminent European chemist, that "no sensible loss arises from spraling unfermented manure on the surface of a field, because formentation ceases almost entirely when It is sprend; and that if manure is lett on the surface until all its. liquid parts are wasked into the ground, it is better than though it had been buried at once. This is so especially on clayer

It seems to be forgotten by many who advicate this practice, that fresh manures are generally full of the seeds of weeds, which must spring up at once and give the former much trouble in subduing them. If the manure were allowed to feement, most of these seeds would be destroyed. It is a good argument for surface manaring that it keeps the ground cooler in Summer and wirmer in Winter. Such a mulch applied to hisfields just aftermowing, prevents them from being dried up, and gives the grass a speedy and vigorous start. It causes the undecomposed ele; ments of the top-soil to decay, and so to become a source of fertility to crops. Surface manuring feeds the roots below with ford convenient for them, viz: in a liquid and exceedingly diluted state, and a little of it at a time. Surely, this is better than placing the course, raw manure directly in contact with the delicate roots. Nature is continually teaching us a lieson on this point. She spreads her fertilizing substinges brondenst. so protecting the toots of trees and plants amid the fronts of Winter and the beals of Summer, and by their gradual decay, furnishing constant

supplies of nourishment. We care not now to sum up, and declare an authoritative opinion on thre sui jedt. With somu h of theory and practice on both sides, it would be assuming the much to do so. The field is open for experiment and study. Every man is likely to hold first to his own opinion, it his practice has been successful. We can only say that our eyes have smarted and our nose tingled too much over the manure beap when disturbed, not to believe that aminonia is lost rapidly and largely when unfermented manore is carted and spread on the open ground. The atmosphere of all the farmy fields about us is too largely charged every Spring with edors of the dung-bonp, to permit us to believe that the ammonia is all washed into the soil. Hence it le pur practice to compost sour manures. and to keep them in the barn-yard until theroughly decomposed. Then, certainly, there will be no sweetness wasted on the desert nir; and the manure may be applied on the surface, or turned under to any depth required by the crop to be

ra ised. We believe that manure should be placed just about where it is wanted. Certain granes have their roots very near the surface, and will be most benefitted by surface manuring, which should be applied in the Fall. Red clover and some grains atrike their roots deeper and need to have the soil manured accordingly. So with fruit trees. Let the application of manure be adjusted to the wants of the plant and the tree .- Correspondence of the American Approulturist.
