The Government seems to be wonderfully annoyed that Schuyikill County Black Heath Coal can be furnished by the contractor at \$3 25 per ton. All its movements in regard to the contract since it was effected, prove it conclusively. It sppears determined to force the contractor inte a position, from which he is to be absolutely com-

That the price is probably, too low, for the contractor to make much. we would be a copiract that would pay very fairly, we know; but we still maintain that at the present price, low as it is, Mr. Brown can fairly fulfill the terms of his contract, if no impediments were thrown in the way of its fulfilment by the Government. Our attention is again called to this matter, in consequence of the very general publication of a telegraphic despatch from Washington, of which the following is a copy :

"Wasmineroy, Sept. 12.-The coal burned on the Wyoming during her trial trip, is reported as the base sever used in the Navy. It came from Schoylkill County, Penna, and costs 80 cents per ton more than the contract price. The differe ton more than the contract price. AL."


