With many farmers, there is a dispesition to avail themselves of cheapness in the price. With others there is marked indifference to quality; and with others still, an almost total disregard of quality or price; they are willing to take the judgment of the vendor, and if the seed prove worthless or not, the kind represented, this latter class satisfy themselves with giving the man from whom they pur-

chased, a good "blowing up," and then trying him again.

Again) when using seed grown by myself, I have been very careful not to sow or plant them on soils of the same character or situation. It has always been my experience, that changing the seed from the lighter to the heavier, or from the eavier to the lighter rot too heavier, or from the seed advantageous. This would amount to nothing, I am aware, upon farms, between the soils of the several parts of which there would be no marked difference. Where such is the case, (unless upon heavy clay soils) the wiser plan if to change the seed at least every two years. to change the seed at least every two years. Another point with me has been always to select for seed those portions of my crops, (I refer to wheat now), which ripens earliest, having as eye of course to size of head, plumpness of grain, &c. Selecting and curing this with care, I never thrash it with the power machine, for the very excellent reason, that machine thrashed wheat is alway'to a greater or less extent, damaged by the operation. Many of the grains are completely broken; while others are so bruised and cracked

as very materially to interfere with germination The old fashioned finit is the proper tool win which to thrash seed wheat. When thrushed, I always put it several tim through my grain-fan, giving it the benefit of the entire blast. After this, I use a sieve or riddit, which retains only the largest and best developed grains, leaving the smaller and less perfect one for flour. Many of the smaller sixed ones, would in all probability, produce as good plants as the larger, but I think it best to pre on the sale side, and that is, to sow the plumpest grains I can get. When I have occasion to purchase seed, I always prefer that which was grown in a warmer climate than our own. My reasons for this course are so clearly set forth, in the following extract, that I must ask a place for it in your columns. It in fact embraces the whole subject, and is well

worth the attention of your wheat-growing read-

ers : "A change of seed is, in general, to be recommended, as founded upon rational principles .-Every species of grain bas a climate adapted to it, where it flourishes, where it grows to perfection, and where it never degenerates. In a country where wheat grows naturally, as in Sicily, seed dropping from the mother plant arrives at perio tion, though neither the seed nor the soil be changed; but, as wheat is not a native of Britain or America either, it has here, a great tendency to degenerate, more especially in the northern districts-and it degenerates rapidly if the scod be sown year after year where it was preduced. Nor is it sufficient that the seed be taken from a different field; it ought also be taken from a different soil, and from a different atmosphere. "In Flanders they rever use the grain or seeds grown on the lands to be sown, nor regard the additional expense attendant on the purchase of seed that is heavier and more bealthy.

"The Farming Society of Ireland, by Its pre-

miums, introduced the habit of sowing seed procured from England; and by this means, the quality of Irish wheat is generally improved. 44 Borides preventing a dogenoracy in the quality of the grain, the crops of the farmer, by a judicious change of seed, will sooner reach maturity-an object in many cases of the greatest moment. English grain sown in Ireland, generally comes to maturity ten days or a fortnight earlier than the native seed under similar circumstances. It is well known, that a change in the constitution of plants, originating from the situation in which they have been placed, is commonly transmitted to their offspring. Plants propagated from seed produced in a warm sandy soil, will therefore grow fast in whatever soil the seed is sown; and plants from seed produced in a enid stiff soil, are late of growing even in a warmer soil. Hence the advantage of changing seed from a warm to a cold soil; for though the seed from a warm soil, will not grow so quickly in a cold soil, as in a warm soil, it will however grow more quickly than seed from a cold soil. The quantity also will generally be increased. From an experiment by Lord Kames, it would appear that the produce of changed seed, exceeds that of old seed, at the ratio of nearly 26 per cont. The farmer however ought not to alter his seed be long as it gives.
