TimeLY attention must be given to the sowing of those esculents intended for early spring use, such as cabbage, caulifi wer, broccoll, spinath, corn raind, &c., &c. Buw cabhage-seed towards the latter part of the month to supply early spring plants. The Barly York is still the most suits. ble variety. Prepare a rich bed in a situation where it can be a little protected. Ihose who have facilities for the cultivation of the cauliflower will attend to the sowing of a few sueds; the Walcheren is the best port. The successful cultivation of the enuliflower for an early crop, involves considerable attention, and for the owner of a small place secreely rapays the trouble. Prickly spinnach for late use, should be sown towards the middle of September, protected a little on the porth by throwing up ridges. They winter safely with the addition of a little sprinkling of litter. A sowing of lettuce or radish may still be made. As crops mature, some persons prefer saving a few zeads for home sowing. Unless saved from pure plants, there is little economy in this, though many act upon it, believ. ing that "a penny saved" is a good maxim. If seeds of parenip, carrot, celery, and other such kinds as are liable to become worthless by keep. ing too long at the reed stores, could be secured the amateur, much risk of disappointment night be avoided. In the article of celery there s frequent losses sustained by the sule of worthless room, not, of course, by any respectable deal-

er or seedsman. One beneficial result claymed for thorough drainage, the Country Gentleman observes, is, that "it lengthens the season for labor and vegetation"an "extension" which the crops and the farmir needs as often as the customer of banks and brekers. That the time required for the "settling of the soil" after the Winter frost passes from it, depends to a great extent upon its porous or its retentive character, is everywhere known and conceiled. The deep gravelly loam is seen to be very soon free from water, while the heavy clay requires a long time to become fit for cultivation-In the one case the soil is fully drained—in te other the water mostly passes off by the slow part cess of eveporation. Thorough drainage of the beavy soil renders both alike in this respect, and thus alds from ten to fifteen;days to time of preparation for seeding-giving the same increased time for the growth of the crops to which the land is devoted.

COLUMELLA, n Roman agricultural writer in the time of the Cmears, states that the fine-wooled Spanish sheep were originally imported from Afrien. Some suppose that there sheep were of the same coarse bairy breed as is now known among the Arabs and along the African coast of the Mediterraneau. But on physiological principles, this idea would be absurd. As well suppose that the Congro negroewould be changed in a couple thousand years to a fair-faced European, with straight blond hair and blue eyes. Wools of the finest quality are now produced in the districts of Tozne, Coffa and Nafta, and in the Nezzah, a ditrict lying south of the main Atlan or Algiers. This wool is used by the Persians and others in the manufacture of those beautiful shawls and other fabrics which bring so high a price in comnerce, . '

Ir a common hen batches out a clutch of young urkeys quite early in the season, she should be coped up in a large, airy coop, with a board botom slightly inclined to one edge. By this means the test will be kept off from the cold, wer earth, and the bottom, will easily be kept free from dropplugs. Later in the season, on dry ground, the bottom of the coop may be emitted; but if it is, the coop should be changed to a new place quite frequently. If the turkey hen hatches out her first litter, she should be confined as the common hen, in a very large coop. But if the ground is warm and dry before she brings off her young, it is an excellent plan to confine the poult- in a pro made of four boards from twelve to sixteen feet

long, and from fitteen to eighteen inches wide. "Twitch Grass" is one of the thousand and no names by which a vexatious peat is known Several years ago, says a correspondent of the Country Gentleman, I had a piece of land that wanted to be taken up, but it was so full of the roots that I dreaded the job; but about the same time I saw a piece in an agricultural paper, that the editor had killed it by planting the land to ootatoes, and after they were dug he turned a rove of pigs into the field. So I tried it, and with perfect success. The land was so full of routs that I got but a small crop of potatres, but the next Spring when I came to plow the land, there were none to be seen.

Recipes.

POTATO APPLE DUMPLINGS. Boil any quantity of white, mealy potatoes; pare them and mach them with a rolling-pin; them dredge in flour amough to form a dough; roll it out about the thickness of pie crust, and make up the dumplings by putting an apple pared, cored and quartered to each. Buil them one hour.

BAKED APPLE PUDDING .- Boil one pound and a half of good' apples with a gill of water, and half a pound of brown sugar, till reduced to a smooth pulp 3/stir in one gill of sweet eream. tablespooning of flour or flow bread crumbs; flavor with a little-lemen juice, or grated lemen, and bake forty minutes.

RICE AND APPLE PUDDING. Buil half a pound of rice in half a pint of milk til! it is soft, then fill the dish half full of apples which have been pared and sored; sweeten with sugar or molasses; put the rice over the fruit as a crust, and bake one

APPLE CREAN .- Very nice .- Pare and boil good stir in a sufficient quantity of sweet cream, and

serve cold. Corrage Punning .- Mix about two pounds of pared, boiled and mashed potatoes with one pins of milk, three eggs well beaten, and two ounces of sugar. Bake three quar ers of an hour, SUNDEBLAND PUDDING .- Six eggs, one pint of cream, a little salt, four tablespoonfuls of flust

and nutmeg. Bake one hour and eat with sweet; SE ICE. POTATO PUDDING .- Two pounds of potatoes boiled and sifted, three-fourths of a pound of sugar, ball pint of cream, seven eggs, and nutmeg. To Passenve Egos.—Set them away in a dry

cellar, standing on their cals, and furn the other end up once a wook. They will keep fresh a year.
