Every farmer knows, that the health of his cattle next Spring will depend much upon their management through the Winter. Their treatment for about six months to come, shut up, and fed on dried food, is an artificial one, and needs to be well conducted. It is said that more than \$600,000,000 are investment not worth looking after? By providing good shelter for stock.— Every man' knows that exposure to a cold wind in Winter (eyon though he does not exercise much) gives him an enormous appetia The carbon in his system is expended in keeping up his vital heat, and he needs a neward large supply of food to restore the waste-So with animals. If they are kept out of doors, exposed to severe winds and frosts, they will be compelled to eat much more to keep themselves warm, than they would if well housed in sheds and stables. If they have only fodder enough to keep up their animal heat, they will decline in flesh; and of course in value. Farmers not at all given to exaggeration, assure us that they find it a loss, of one third of their fodder to try to Winter their stock without adequate shelter.

Their stalls should be cleaned twice every day, and supplied with good dry litter at night.
